The Michaelmas Term began with the Whole School Triathlon challenge, setting the tone for an energetic and purposeful start, inspiring pupils for all that has followed this term.

Cundall pupils have embraced a wide range of enriching opportunities – from trips that extended classroom learning to hands-on workshops and impressive sporting achievements. Highlights include the U13 girls' strong performance at the Loretto tour, securing 4th place out of 24 touring sides, and their success in progressing to the North Yorkshire County Hockey Finals in November.

Year 8 pupils immersed themselves in French culture on the Château Trip to Normandy and Year 11 explored the Yorkshire Moors for their final Silver Duke of Edinburgh expedition.

Cundall also celebrated remarkable results in the ISA Art Competition, with seven first-place winners and two second-place awards at the North Area judging, progressing to the National finals. Pupils further showcased their creativity and confidence through musical performances, Harvest Festivals, and we look forward to the Prep production of The First Kids in Space and Pre-Prep Nativity after half term.

Thanks to the generous support of Friends of Cundall, pupils have enjoyed a newly uplifted Boarding House environment, along with a host of exciting Halloween events and discos in the last week of term, that allowed pupils from across year groups to socialise with one another and have fun.

We look forward to even more success and memorable experiences as the year continues.

Triathlon Triumph: Endurance, Teamwork and School spirit

From Year 3 through to Year 11, congratulations to every pupil who took part in this unique Cundall tradition- House Triathlon.

For the youngest participants in Year 3, the event was their very first introduction to an endurance challenge, tackling a swim, cycle and run. Completing the course at the beginning of the academic year gives pupils a confidence boost that carries well beyond the sports field and into the classroom.

Head of Girls' Games, Louise Bessey, explained:

"The triathlon is about much more than fitness. Pupils discover their own resilience, push through nerves or tiredness, and quickly realise they're capable of more than they imagined. That sense of achievement translates into determination for every challenge they face throughout the year."

While each pupil takes on the course as an individual, the atmosphere is very much one of teamwork. Pupils cheer each other on, celebrate successes together, and share in the satisfaction of crossing the finish line. For new pupils especially, the event creates an immediate sense of belonging and inclusion.

The triathlon reminds pupils that sport is about participation and personal achievement as much as competition. The benefits extend beyond physical activity, boosting self-esteem, well-being and overall happiness.



Al fresco Castle Challenge

As part of their castles topic, the children took part in a hands-on al fresco learning workshop that brought history to life. They began by learning the names of different parts of a castle and discovering the locations of some of the UK's most famous examples.

Working in teams, the children then set about constructing a giant castle of their own. In groups they attached bamboo sticks with rubber bands to form squares, which were combined into cubes. Piece by piece, these cubes were joined together to build the castle structure, complete with turret, moat and drawbridge. The activity encouraged excellent teamwork, with plenty of communication, collaboration and problem-solving on display.

To complete their creation, each child designed a flag for the castle using a simple but creative technique. A linen square was decorated with carefully arranged flower petals, then folded and pressed with a rock to reveal a beautiful symmetrical pattern.



Recreating the Past: Building a Thomas Farrar Bakery

During their Great Fire of London learning journey, Years 1 & 2 explored wattle and daub, discovering how buildings were made in the past. They wove sticks, worked with mud and straw and compared materials with those used today - before constructing their miniature Thomas Farrar bakery.





Exploring River Landscapes in the Yorkshire Dales

Thornton (Year 11) are studying how the River Swale changes as it moves downstream. They travelled up into the Dales and visited Wainwath Force, Muker and Gunnerside. The river levels prevented the group from getting into the river but they carried out tests such as river velocity, gradient and bedload angularity. This valuable fieldwork experience has provided pupils with first-hand evidence to support their understanding of fluvial processes and river dynamics. The pupils all worked really well as a group to complete the tests accurately.



Year 5 Art Adventure

Set in over 45 acres of stunning woodland and landscaped gardens, the Himalayan Gardens near Ripon, is home to more than 90 contemporary sculptures displayed among lakes, a Himalayan-style pagoda, and vibrant seasonal planting. Year 5 spent time sketching a variety of sculptures and landscapes, focusing on bringing texture and form into their artwork. It was a fantastic opportunity to experience so many impressive sculptures first-hand.





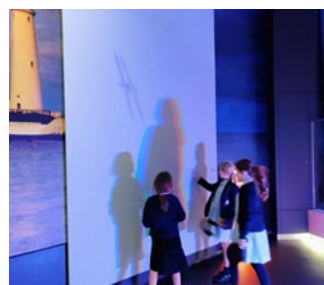
A Day of Discovery at Newcastle's Life Science Centre

Our pupils enjoyed an exciting visit to the Newcastle Life Science Centre, taking part in a variety of hands-on workshops and interactive exhibits. For Year 6, the day began with the Discovery Chemistry Workshop, where students mixed chemicals to produce colourful reactions, before heading to the Space Zone to explore constellations and try their hand at weather forecasting. In the Brain Zone, pupils navigated a challenging mirror maze, and the Light Fantastic Workshop introduced them to Sir Isaac Newton's discoveries and the science of light, creating dazzling rainbows and sparkling disco balls. They also explored the Light Box, experimenting with swirling lights, a tornado simulation, and an electrical sneak game, before ending their adventure in the Wow Zone with motion and target-based challenges. It was a fantastic day of discovery, giving everyone the chance to experience science in a fun and engaging way.



Year 4 also had a memorable experience, exploring the same centre through a range of different workshops and exhibits. They attended the "Is it Fake?" science show, where a series of experiments and demonstrations encouraged them to question what's real and what's illusion. In the Disgusting Digestion Workshop, pupils traced the journey of food through the body using interactive models, before visiting the Planetarium to observe stars, planets, and constellations. Their exploration continued in the Brain and Light Zones, experimenting with colours, reflections, and even seeing a real human brain on display.

The trip provided practical and inspiring opportunities for both year groups, bringing science to life and reinforcing classroom learning in a truly memorable way.



Year 7 Visits Zillah Bell Gallery

Aram (Year 7) enjoyed an inspiring art trip to the Zillah Bell Gallery in Thirsk, where students viewed work by a range of artists and ceramicists, including Jo Taylor and Norman Ackroyd and made sketches of the pieces on display. They then visited Thirsk Hall Sculpture Park, creating their own clay sculptures inspired by the works in the park, before exploring the Ben Uri collection at Thirsk Hall, which featured sculptures by Jacob Epstein and Dora Gordine. A fabulous day out celebrating local art and gaining inspiration.



Discovering Habitats and Wildlife

Year 2 were very excited to go on their first trip of the year to Flamingo Land Zoo where they had the opportunity to look at many animals including lemurs, parrots, zebras, rhinos, cheetahs, giraffes, tigers, red pandas, penguins and flamingos. They were lucky enough to hold a cockroach and stroke a tenrec! The children learned many interesting facts including: lemurs have 13 stripes on their tails which is raised in the air and used as a flag to communicate when they travel; red pandas have paws that can rotate 180 degrees to give them good balance to be good climbers; every zebra's stripes are different just like human fingerprints; zebras are pregnant for 26 months and a group of white rhinos is called a Crash. It was wonderful to have such personal, one-to-one attention from Jake, our Educational Zoo Keeper, where he was able to share his knowledge and experience with us and happily answer our many animal related questions. It was rewarding to hear the children having the confidence and knowledge to answer many questions about what a habitat is and how animals adapt and change to suit their environment.





Exploring the Circulatory System

Mr Thyne's Year 6 class have been busy getting hands-on with the circulatory system this term. There was plenty of excitement (and a few squeals!) as they dissected a real heart to see how it works. Afterwards, pupils became the blood themselves, modelling the incredible journey it takes as it pumps through the heart, travels to the lungs and races around the body.



Outdoor Explorations in the Wild Wood

During their weekly Wild Wood lessons, pupils explored a wide range of learning opportunities in the great outdoors.

Reception children enjoyed identifying their five favourite things in the Wild Wood and confidently sharing their choices with the class, explaining what made each one special.



Year 4 took their Maths learning outside, using sticks found in nature to develop their estimation and measuring skills. They ordered their sticks by length, calculated the difference between the longest and shortest, and compared their results with classmates.

Year 6 explored the incredible variety of nests built by different bird species. After studying these natural constructions, they worked together to create their own nests, using and adapting some of the same techniques employed by the birds themselves.





European Day of Languages: The Great MFL Bake Off!

The Great Modern Languages Bake Off proved a resounding success with such wonderful creative and imaginative cakes entered. The queue in the quad was extra long as pupils enjoyed a sweet treat in exchange for hearing "thank you" in multiple languages! £167 was raised for the charity Just B.



A Magical Theatre Experience at the Alhambra

Aram (Year 7) and GCSE Drama and the Leckby (Year 9) Performing Arts group, went to the Alhambra Theatre, Bradford, to watch a stunning production of 'The Lion, The Witch & The Wardrobe'.

Told through the use of puppets, physical theatre and creative sets, the play with music tells the story of the Pevensie children who are evacuated to a large house in the countryside during WW2, and the adventures they have when they find an entrance from their house into the magical world of Narnia.

The students were impeccably behaved at the theatre, they were even complimented by an usher! It was so lovely to have so many pupils boarding afterwards. Making use of our boarding house with a late return.



Printmaking Workshop

Our Thornton (Year 11) and Eldmire (Year 10) Art and Textiles students recently took part in an inspiring printmaking workshop led by Vicky Senior at the West Yorkshire Print house. They were introduced to Risograph printing and experimented with text and image which corresponded to their individual GCSE projects, creating vibrant, layered poster designs. The activity encouraged them to think carefully about language and design choices—how bold lettering can emphasise key words, while subtler details invite viewers to look more closely. Through this process, they explored how colour, composition, and typography can work together to capture attention and communicate ideas effectively.



Pre-Prep Harvest Festival

Our Harvest Festival at Cundall Church provided an opportunity for pupils to share their work and performances with the school community. Children confidently sang, recited poems, and presented artwork illustrating the journey of food from field to fork.

Reverend Bob led the service, and the festival offered a meaningful way to mark the season while celebrating the pupils' efforts and creativity.



Our Prep and Senior school came together for a Harvest Assembly with hymns, prayers, readings, and anthems led by our senior prefects and Reverend Bob. With so many of our Cundall families involved in farming, it gave us the chance to reflect on our gratitude to them and to everyone who helps provide us with so much good food, while also remembering those who are less fortunate. Annika, Amelie, Erin P., and Harriet S. created freshly baked bread wreaths — a delicious and decorative addition for the hampers — and Year 3 enjoyed harvest baking bread hedgehogs. A generous collection of food donated for our Harvest Hampers competition was then taken to the Community Works food banks in Thirsk, which supports over a thousand people each year who might otherwise go hungry. Three Days, 30 Miles



Two groups of Thornton (Year 11) pupils recently completed their final Silver Duke of Edinburgh expedition, a demanding three-day challenge across the North York Moors. Each group planned their own 30-mile routes, navigating from Great Ayton to Comondale, then onto Kirby, and finishing at Cod Beck on Sunday.

The expedition tested their physical endurance, navigation, and teamwork, with the desolate moors made even more challenging by early morning mist on Saturday. Undeterred, the pupils demonstrated resilience, problem-solving, and strong leadership throughout. Both groups completed the expedition successfully and passed with flying colours, earning an important milestone towards their Silver Award.

From Garden to Plate: Year 3 Visit Harlow Carr

As part of their Science topic on Humans and healthy eating, Year 3 visited Harlow Carr to learn about where our food comes from and how to eat a balanced diet. The children took it in turns to harvest different vegetables and spot how vegetables are grown. They also sowed their own seeds to bring home.



House Glory at the Conker Championships

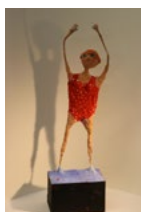

Loretto Rugby Sevens & Hockey Tournament.

Cundall Manor's U11 and U13 rugby and hockey teams enjoyed a fantastic day of sport at the prestigious Preparatory Schools & Clubs Rugby Sevens and Hockey Tournament, hosted by Loretto School. With 24 teams from across Scotland and the North of England taking part, it was a brilliant opportunity for our pupils to challenge themselves, build teamwork and compete at a high level.

The girls' hockey teams were on superb form throughout the day. The U11s showed tremendous improvement and determination, finishing 5th overall and proudly taking home the Bowl Winners title. The U13s played some of their best hockey of the season – winning their opening matches convincingly and fighting hard right through to the Plate Final, where they were narrowly defeated 0–1 to finish 4th overall.

A particular highlight was Florrie being named U13 Player of the Tournament – an outstanding honour especially given the strength of the competition.



Head of Girls' Games, Louise Bessey, praised the players' efforts:

"I am incredibly proud of how our teams performed against some very talented opposition. The girls in particular played some of the best hockey we've seen this season, and all our pupils showed tremendous spirit and determination throughout the day."

On the rugby pitches, both the U11 and U13 boys demonstrated excellent teamwork, resilience, and improvement as the tournament progressed. The U11 boys grew stronger with every game, while the U13 team started with a strong win before narrowly missing out in the Bowl final.

Cundall Manor extends a huge thank you to Loretto School for hosting such a well-organised and enjoyable tournament. The event provided invaluable experience for all involved and has left players inspired, confident and motivated for the rest of the season.



Sporting Summaries

The Michaelmas Term saw Year 3 pupils introduced to hockey and tag rugby, and they have all made excellent progress in their fixtures. On the hockey pitch, the girls have enjoyed a strong half-term, competing against teams from Ashville, Aysgarth, Barnard Castle, Queen Mary's, Scarborough College, St Aidan's, Teesside High, Terrington, and Yarm. The U13 girls came 2nd in the Area Hockey Tournament, advancing to the North Yorkshire County finals in November. The U14s narrowly missed out on progressing to the next round of the North Yorkshire County Tournament, despite not conceding a goal, while the U16s finished their season impressively with a 6-0 victory against Ripon Grammar. The younger U9s and U8s also had a fantastic tournament at Yarm, winning five games and drawing two.

In rugby, the U9s' Contact Festival showcased fantastic teamwork, with wins against St Peter's and Richmond House. Across the term teams played competitive fixtures against Aysgarth, Barnard Castle, Bootham, Mowden Hall, Pocklington, Red House, Richmond House, Scarborough College, Sedbergh, St Peter's, Terrington, and Yarm with some great wins. The U12 Boys Rugby Team have had an outstanding start to the season, going unbeaten in the first half of term. Their hard work, teamwork, and determination on the pitch have set a fantastic standard for the rest of the term, showing great promise for the matches ahead.

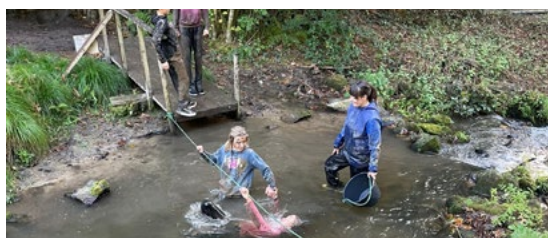

Adventure, Culture, and French Immersion in Normandy

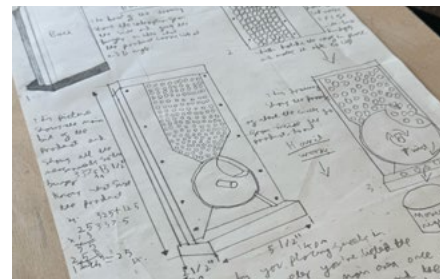

Boarding House Highlights

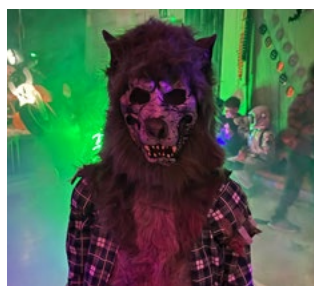
